Dear Parents/Carers,

The focus for this month has been our end of year assessments. We started with our Year 6 SATs week. The children approached the week with a 'can do' attitude and impressed us all with their determination. You may have seen the coverage about these tests in the news and the difficulty of them, particularly the reading paper. While assessments are important, they are only a snapshot in time and measure a limited amount. As well as being good readers, writers and mathematicians we want our children to leave us ready for the next stage in their learning. The tests do not measure artistic, musical or sporting ability; neither do they measure a pupil's character. Year 6 are now busy completing their writing assessments as well as preparing for their end of term show and transition to secondary school.

There are currently assessments for Year 2 and upcoming assessments for Year 1, and some Year 2s, in phonics and Year 4 in their times tables. I am sure all of these children will show determination and resilience as they embrace the opportunity to show what they have learnt.

In this newsletter you will find out about all the other amazing things that have been taking place this half term, including the King's Coronation celebration and the Year 6 trip to Duxford.

Safeguarding

This time of year the PSHE topics are around relationships and how our body changes. These topics are covered in our Jigsaw lessons and are taught at an age appropriate level.

In all year groups we discuss the term consent and what it means. Consent is when we seek permission for something to happen or make an agreement to do something. It requires respect and communication from people involved and is an important concept for children to learn about from a young age. Consent includes knowledge about, and respect for, their own and others' boundaries.

This is something that is taught across the curriculum from Reception to Year 6. If a child understands the concept of consent, they will be more likely to have the skills to remove themselves from situations where they feel uncomfortable and respect when others want to do the same. Understanding consent is the basis for understanding sexual consent later in life.

If your child wants to talk about these topics, it is best to try to find a good time to start a conversation. Pick a time when your child's relaxed and when there aren't other people in your family around. It can help to make the conversation relevant to something that's happened recently. For example, if you've been watching a TV series or film where one of the characters is in a relationship. Try not to rush the conversation and let your child talk to you in their own time.

We also teach that children need to respect their own and each others bodies. This is covered in the PSHE curriculum and we also use the NSPCC Pantosaurus video and material. These can be found at https://www.nspcc.org.uk/keeping-

Sporting News
